Executive Summary – Belstar CSR: Community Connect Initiatives (July–September 2025)

Overall Objective:

To advance holistic women's empowerment through integrated interventions in Skill Training, Health, and Capacity Building under the *Swasthya–Skill–Samman* initiative.

Skill Training

- Implemented under the skill development and training initiative across 13 states.
- 194 training programs completed, reaching 4,183 beneficiaries – primarily women and youth.
- 92 distinct skill trades introduced, designed to match local market demand.
- 1,655 participants received certificates upon completion.
- 51 women established self-employment ventures using acquired skills.
- Activities conducted through 800 Belstar branches ensuring coordination and transparency.
- Monitoring ensured via attendance verification, geotagged photos, and *mWater app* reporting.
- Challenges: Monsoon disruptions, agricultural season, and domestic responsibilities affected attendance.
- Next phase: Trainings planned in Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Haryana, Tripura, and Delhi.

Health

- Conducted 181 general medical camps across states, benefiting 16,840 individuals.
- Operated 4 Hospital Help Desks in Thoothukudi, Erode, Vellore (TN) and Saharanpur (UP), assisting 2,01,458 people.
- Services covered OP, IP, diagnostic, emergency, and support categories.
- Health awareness programs organized during *World Breastfeeding Week* and *National Nutrition Week*, benefiting 250+ participants.
- 17,839 ABHA cards created to promote digital health access.
- Focused on maternal, child, and differently abled care through linkages and referrals.
- Institutional coordination strengthened through renewed government hospital partnerships.

Capacity Building for SHG women members for inclusive development

- Implemented across Karnataka, Kerala, and Tamil Nadu, targeting 1.5 lakh women in 141 Belstar branches.
- Focus on strengthening Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and Community Leaders' Networks (CLNs).
- 88 existing CLNs nurtured and 61 new CLNs formed, engaging 5,645 women members.
- Conducted training for 24,006 women:
 - Financial Literacy: 10,700 participants
 - Digital Literacy: 6,655 participants
 - Business Motivation: 7,651 participants
- 3,580 women sensitized on government schemes: 2,892 accessed welfare benefits.
- Enhanced leadership, financial discipline, and entrepreneurial capacity among SHG members.

Community Connect through Skill Trainings for Women Members in Self Help Groups



1. Key Highlights (As of September 2025)

- **194 skill training programs** successfully completed across **13 states**, benefiting a total of **4,183 individuals**.
- **92 distinct skill trades** introduced and conducted across various locations, tailored to local demand and resource availability.
- **1,655 beneficiaries** successfully received **certificates** upon completion of their respective training programs.
- Select training programs were **featured in local newspapers**, enhancing community visibility and encouraging broader participation.
- 51 women became self-employed after completing their training, utilizing their newly acquired skills to start or strengthen their livelihoods.

2. Project Locations

The Skill Training initiatives under the Skill Development and Technology Centre (SDTC) have been implemented across 13 states in India — Tamil Nadu (including Puducherry), Karnataka, Kerala, Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, West Bengal, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Gujarat, Telangana, and Jharkhand — with upcoming trainings being planned in Odisha, Chhattisgarh, Haryana, Tripura, and Delhi.

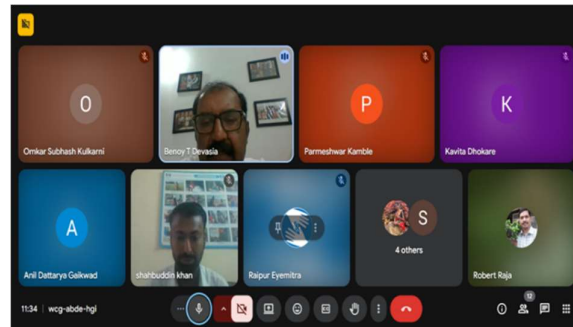

4.Methodology for Trade and Beneficiary Selection

Project Team Formation and Orientation

A dedicated project team was formed, comprising project coordinators, subject trainers, and volunteers. An orientation meeting was conducted with all relevant staff members to communicate the project's objectives, target outcomes, and anticipated impact. This initial session ensured alignment and clarity among the implementation team.



Needs Assessment and Coordination

Based on the local demand, appropriate training programs were designed to address both market relevance and community needs. The beneficiaries have identified primarily from low-income households—who would benefit from skill enhancement. This list served as the basis for beneficiary selection.

Trade Selection Criteria

The trades for training were selected based on:

- Local market demand
- Community needs
- Availability of local resources
- Long-term sustainability potential

This strategic approach ensured that the skills imparted were not only practical but also aligned with local livelihood opportunities.

Beneficiary Identification

Beneficiaries were selected through a structured process involving:

- Community nominations
- Field officer screening
- Evaluation of interest and aptitude

The target group consisted exclusively of women who are members of Belstar Self-Help Groups (SHGs). Priority was given to those with existing knowledge or strong interest in the relevant trades to maximize the impact of the training.

Training Locations

Skill training sessions were conducted at:

- Selected village locations
- Belstar branch offices

These accessible locations ensured maximum participation and minimized logistical barriers for the trainees.

Skill Training Implementation

Training programs were delivered through community-based centers and covered both agricultural and non-agricultural trades. The training modules included:

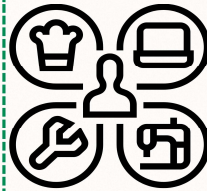
- **Basic Training (2 Days):**
Designed to build initial awareness, spark interest in the selected trades, and introduce foundational concepts essential for further skill development.

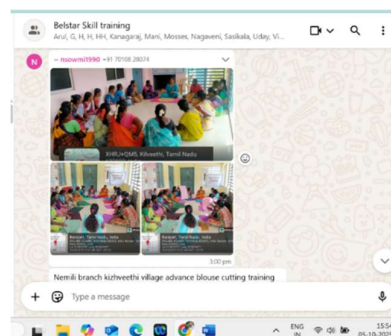
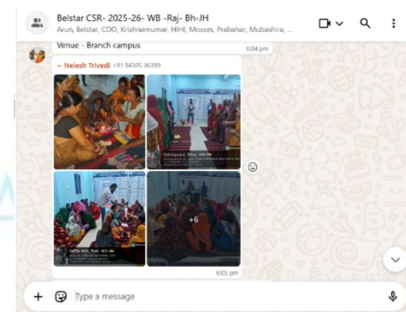

6.Documentation and Reporting

- **Attendance :**
Trainers obtained **signatures from each participant** (women) who attended the two-day training sessions at respective locations. **Attendance sheets** were attached to the **monthly training reports** for reference and documentation.
- **Geotagged Photo Documentation:**
The team captured **geotagged photographs** at each training location. These photos were included in the **monthly reports** for verification and record-keeping purposes.
- **Case Study Collection:**
Case studies have been **collected from a few states** to document individual beneficiary impact stories.
 - The team is in the **process of following up** and collecting additional case studies from other locations.
- **mWater App Training & Use:**
The **HHI Monitoring & Evaluation (M&E) team** provided orientation on using the **mWater app** for reporting and documentation.
 - The field team has since been actively **uploading data**, including:
 - **Needs assessment numbers (sample-based)**
 - **Training photos**
 - **Participant feedback**
 - These updates are submitted via the app on a **monthly basis** to ensure real-time monitoring and transparency.

7.Monitoring and review meeting

- **Field Monitoring & Quality Assurance:**
Concerned staff conducted **regular field visits** to monitor ongoing training sessions. They verified data on-site and ensured that the trainings were conducted **in line with quality standards and project expectations**.
- **Review Meetings:**
The team held **review meetings** to assess progress, address field-level challenges, and provide **timely guidance and inputs** to enhance the pace and quality of the training programs.
 - Teams actively share **training-related documents, attendance sheets, and geotagged photos** through these groups, ensuring **prompt updates and improved coordination**.
- **State-wise WhatsApp Groups for Coordination:**
Each participating state created an **official WhatsApp group** to facilitate real-time communication among project staff.



8. Key Challenges



- Continuous heavy rainfall and the ongoing agricultural season significantly disrupted mobilization and training schedules, as many women were engaged in farming and found it difficult to attend sessions.
- Seasonal festivals and household responsibilities, such as preparations for Dussehra, further limited women's participation in training programs during this period.
- Many beneficiaries, particularly daily wage earners, were hesitant to attend training programs due to the potential loss of daily income.
- Limited digital literacy, inadequate market linkages, and the need for sustained post-training support continue to affect the long-term sustainability and income generation potential of trained beneficiaries.

9. Sustainability through Post-Training Follow-Up

Beneficiaries are requesting machinery and material support to start their own businesses and they have been referred to banks and financial institutions.

Direction of self-reliance through hand creations: Hand in Hand India



Nawada. On the auspicious occasion of the month of Sawan, a two-day Handicraft Art Skill Training Program was organized in Mirzapur village under Nawada branch, courtesy of Hand in Hand India and Bistlar Microfinance Limited, in which 30 members participated enthusiastically. The objective of this program was to strengthen the path of self-reliance of women members by training them for self-employment. Trainer Renu Kumar informed the women about the professional techniques of mehndi designing so that they can adopt it as a livelihood in future. Project Manager Nilesh Kumar said that this training program has been organized with the aim of enabling rural women to become self-reliant and to develop their own business. By adding mehndi art as an enterprise. On the occasion of the completion of the training, certificates were distributed to all the trainees by Rav Ranjan, Branch Manager of Bistlar Nawada Branch. Along with this, 3 women who performed best were specially honored.

On this occasion, Ravi Ranjan gave Belstar's certificate to the women. They were given detailed information about loan services, Samridhi App, digital payment facility, and the importance of paying installments on time and were motivated. All the employees of Nawada Belstar branch along with the regional trainer of the organization Shashi Kumar played an important role in making the training program successful.

CASE STUDIES

Bihar State

Case study -1

Empowering Women through Mehndi Skill

As a part of our holistic approach to women empowerment Hand In Hand India in collaboration with Belstar Microfinance Ltd organized a two days skill training program in the Mirzapur village of Nawada district, Bihar. The training was especially designed around the *festive month of saavan*, focusing Mehndi Art & designing – a culturally significant and income generation skill for members.

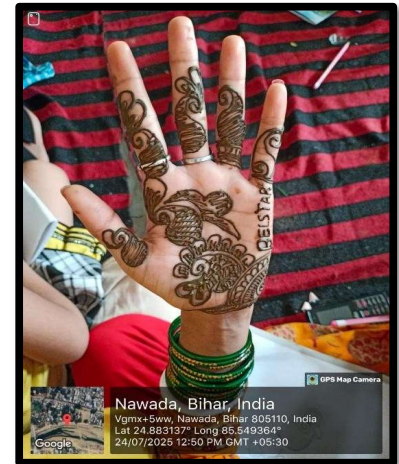
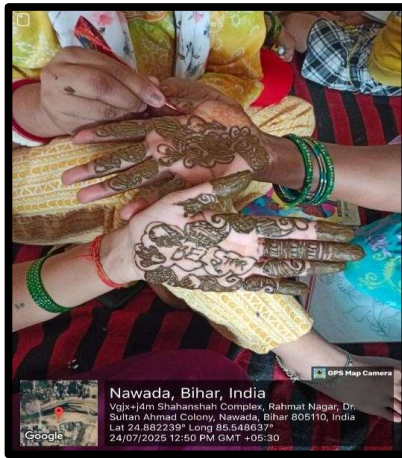
A total of 25 members actively participated, including 20 Belstar members & 5 Jeevika members. For 22 of them, this was their first ever experience of any structured training & certification.

We Identified and selected Ms. Renu Kumari as a trainer for this training program, she is one of the Belstar member a professional mehndi Artist and independently managing a beauty parlor business. By engaging a local Belstar member entrepreneur as the trainer, the program not only built capacity but also showcased learning and inspiration. Under her guidance, members learned Mehndi art techniques and creative designing and gained new confidence. At the end of program, all the participants were awarded with completion certificates, which filled them with pride & delight.

To celebrate the learning, a Mehndi designing competition was organized among the participants, where three participants were recognized for their best design. The initiative not only enhanced the skills of members but also built their confidence and inspired them through a role model from their own community.

Case study 2

Strengthening Skills: Makhana Processing Training

Hand in Hand India, in collaboration with Belstar Microfinance initiated working on a holistic approach to women's empowerment by promoting skill-based livelihoods. In Madhubani district of Bihar, particularly in Ranti village, Makhana (fox nut) cultivation and processing is a traditional occupation, with most families engaged in it for generations. However, women often remain at the margins of this business, limited to labour-based roles without exposure to improved processing, packaging, or direct market linkages.

To strengthen women's participation in this sector, a two-day skill training program on Makhana processing was conducted at Ranti village, Madhubani. A total of 25 participants attended, including 22 Belstar members and 3 Jeevika members.

A local woman trainer- Siya Devi, whose family has been engaged in Makhana cultivation and processing for over five years, led the sessions. Her deep practical knowledge and lived experience made the training both relatable and impactful.



Key Learning from the training:

- Harvesting and sorting of foxnut (*Makhana*)
 - Traditional and modern processing methods
 - Roasting, grading, and packaging techniques
 - Basic business knowledge and market understanding
- Participants gained knowledge from harvesting to market readiness. Discussions also emerged on forming collective groups to pool resources, reduce costs, and reach better markets together. Special emphasis on packaging and branding helped them realize how value addition can increase profitability. By the end of the program, the participants not only developed practical skills but also a vision for self-employment. The training inspired them to see Makhana not just as a household activity but as a pathway to building small enterprises and improving their livelihoods.



Case study 3

UTTAR PRADESH

Parmila, a resident of Maharajganj, Uttar Pradesh has transformed her life through entrepreneurship. She initially ran a small general store but had limited income. However, after receiving training from the **HIH INDIA (BELSTAR CSR SKILL TRAINING)**, she learned new skills in food processing, particularly in making **PICKLES AND VINEGAR**. This knowledge has helped her expand her business and improve her financial stability.

The training Enhanced her with essential skills in food preservation, packaging, and marketing. She learned the art of making high-quality Pickles & Vinegar, which she could produce at a low cost but sell at a significant profit margin.

She used fresh ingredients and ensured high-quality production to attract more customers. Her products quickly gained popularity in the local market due to their taste, affordability, and hygienic preparation.

Parmila did not limit her sales to her general store. She actively participated in various National Rural Livelihoods Mission (NRLM) fairs, where she showcased and sold her homemade products.

She now earns a higher profit margin and has a stable source of income. Her success has also inspired other women in her community to explore

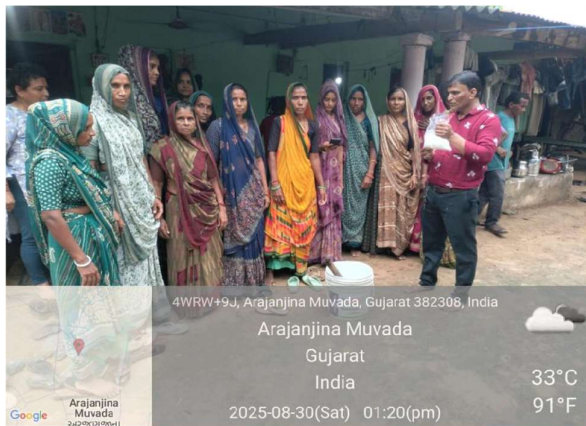

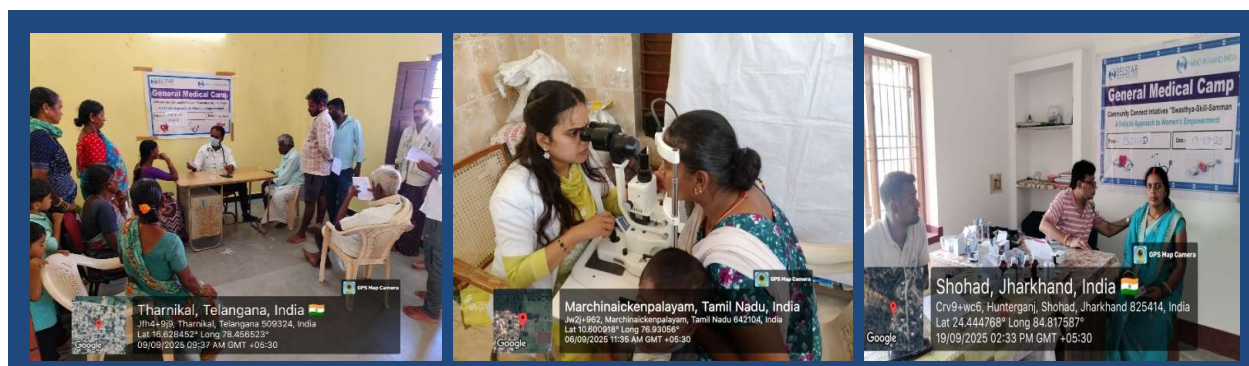

Project progress (Jun-Sep 25)

1. Baseline Study:

- A preliminary visit to Government Theni Medical College and Hospital (GTMCH) was completed on 23/07/2025 to assess the requisition for setting up a Health Help Desk.

2. Stakeholder Meetings:

- The renewal letter of permission for the Health Help Desk at Tuticorin has been submitted. Additionally, letters regarding the closure of two previously operated Help Desks at Vellore and Erode have also been submitted (June–July).
- The renewal letter of permission for the Health Help Desk at Erode was received from the Dean till December 2025 and for Tuticorin till March 2026 (August).
- Vellore Help Desk continued operations until September 2025.

3. Staff Training & Capacity Building:

- Four virtual training sessions were conducted for the State Project Teams and State Heads across 18 states, focusing on Standard Operating Procedures (SOP) for organizing medical camps, budget allocation guidelines, and strategies for effective, localized budget utilization.
- State Heads along with their team members participated from Madhya Pradesh, Tamil Nadu, Bihar, Jharkhand, and West Bengal, while only the State Heads attended from the remaining 13 states.

4. Hospital Help Desk:

- From Jun to Sep, a total of 2, 01,458 people were assisted across all four help desks.

5. Awareness Program:

- In August, World Breastfeeding Week awareness programs were organized at the District Women's Hospital, Saharanpur, and Thoothukudi Government Medical College Hospital, benefiting a total of 85 participants.
- In September, National Nutrition Week awareness programs were conducted at Thoothukudi Government Medical College Hospital, Thanthai Periyar District

Headquarters Super Specialty Hospital in Erode, and Vellore Government Medical College and Hospital, benefiting a total of 165 participants.

6. General Medical Camps:

- A total of 181 general medical camps were conducted from June to September, benefiting 16,840 individuals.
- A total of 13 general medical camps were conducted during June and July, benefiting 1,343 individuals, with 39 cases referred for further medical attention.
- A total of 93 general medical camps were conducted in August, benefiting 8,549 individuals, with 408 cases referred for further medical attention.
- A total of 75 general medical camps were conducted, benefiting 6,948 individuals
- In August, 1,249 Belstar customers benefited from medical camps in the southern region.

Key Highlights

- The current e-token services reached **36,760 pregnant mothers, 253 post-natal care mothers, 1,876 children, 1,321 differently abled people, and 160 elders.**
- ABHA cards were created for **17,839 beneficiaries.**

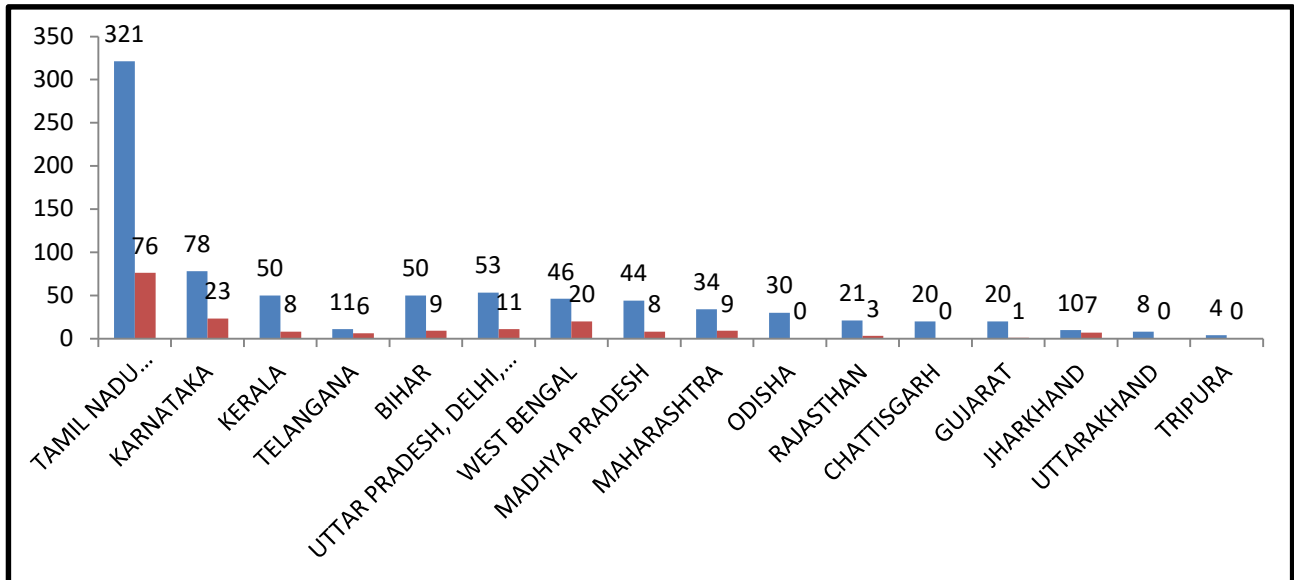

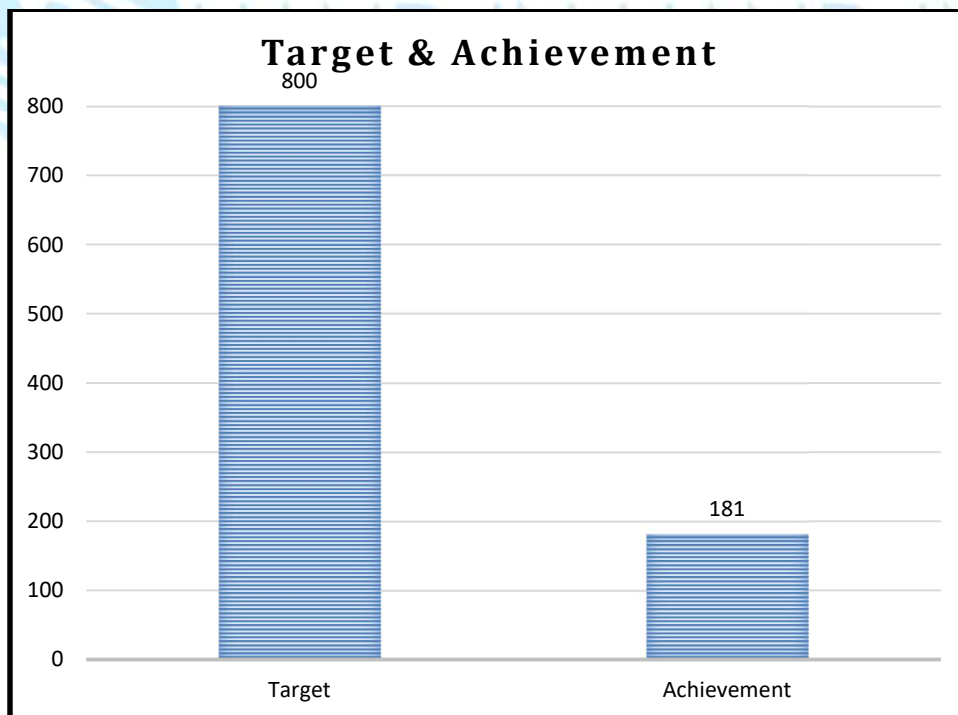

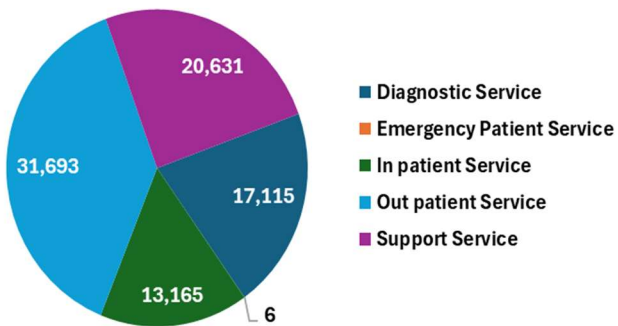

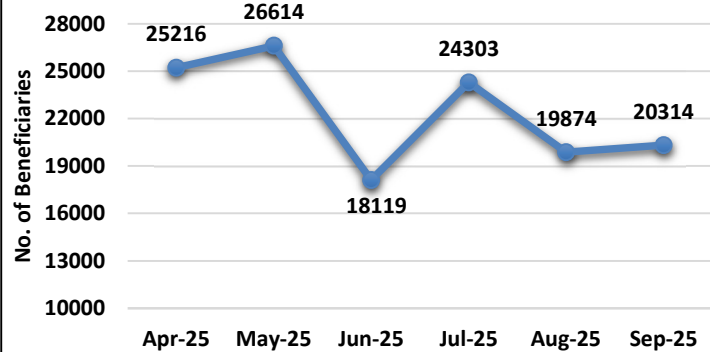
Graphical representation of Hospital Help Desk Services (Jun-Sep)

HHD Services Distribution - Thoothukudi



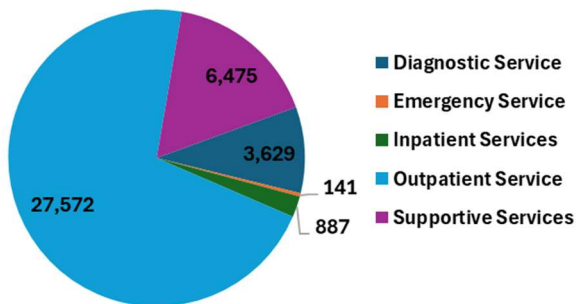

Overview of Thoothukudi HHD Service FY 2025-26



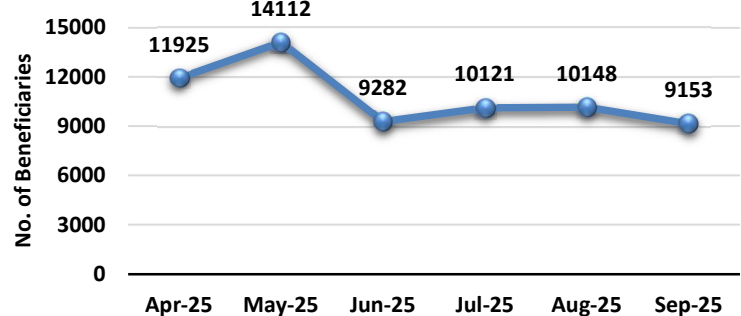

HHD Services of Distribution - Vellore



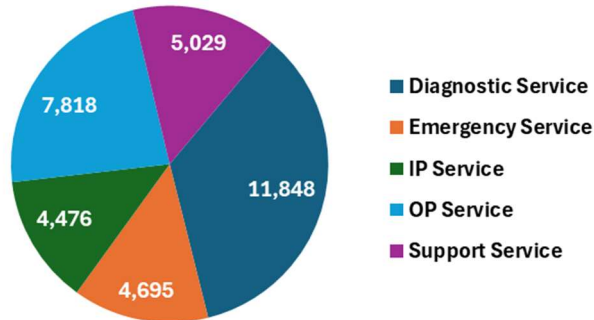

Overview of Vellore HHD Service FY 2025-26

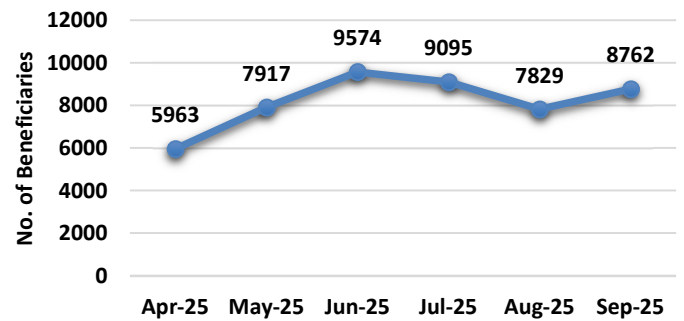

HHD Services Distribution - Saharanpur



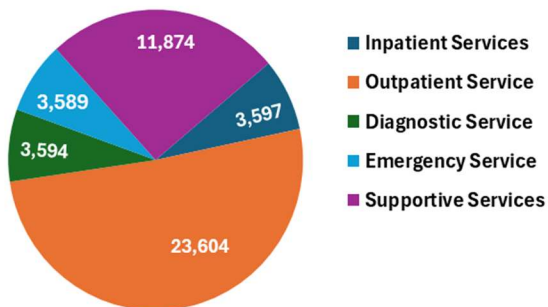
Overview of Saharanpur HHD Service FY'25-26



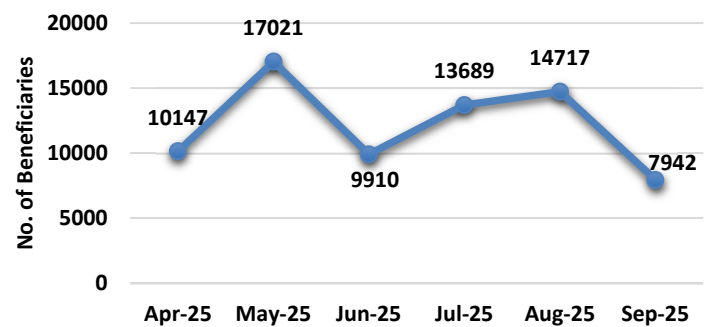

CASE STUDIES

Supporting a Patient Through Dental Surgery with Compassion

Name: Isakkiammal

Pre-Intervention:

Isakkiammal, a 32-year-old female, approached the Help Centre on 29.09.2025, reporting severe tooth pain for a week. She was hesitant to seek treatment due to fear of pain and had no one accompanying her for support.

Intervention:

The Help Centre staff reassured her and assisted in registering for outpatient services. She was guided to the dentist, who diagnosed a crooked tooth near her last molar requiring extraction. Preliminary tests including blood sugar, blood pressure, and a dental X-ray were conducted with the staff's assistance. After reviewing the results, the dentist confirmed the need for minor surgery. The staff accompanied her to the dental surgery theater, provided reassurance, and ensured she received pain management medicines prior to the procedure.



Post-Intervention:

On 3.10.2025, Isakkiammal returned for the surgery. With continuous support and encouragement from the staff, she underwent the 45-minute procedure successfully. Post-operative instructions for a soft diet and limited chewing were given. She expressed gratitude for the reassurance and guidance, acknowledging the Help Centre's role in giving her courage. The experience also provided the staff with valuable learning about unique dental surgical procedures.

Pre-Intervention:

Rathinammal, a 40-year-old woman from Mailam, Agoor Panchayat, and a Belstar Lending customer, was facing financial difficulties. She was having irregular menstrual cycle (No blood flow for a longtime).

Intervention:

During a field visit, the staff identified her condition and immediately took her to the nearby government hospital for medical treatment, and she admitted in hospital for five days practiced exercises too. She was also enrolled under PIMS Medical camp. The staff ensured that she received proper care and support during the visit.

Post-Intervention:

Rathinammal is now recovering and feeling much better. She also got her periods after the treatment and exercises. Medicines were prescribed and she was discharged. She expressed heartfelt gratitude to the Belstar staff for their timely intervention, medical support, and care. She acknowledged their humanitarian service and stated that she would never forget the help provided.

Timely Assistance and Compassionate Care for an Eye Injury Case

Pre-Intervention:

Mr. Rangasamy, aged 64 from Elumathur village, approached the Help Centre after oil accidentally entered his eyes. He was uncertain about where to seek medical care and was experiencing severe eye discomfort.



Intervention:

Help Centre staff member Mr. S. Nandakumar guided him through the hospital procedures. He assisted Rangasamy in obtaining an OP ticket from Room No. 5 and facilitated a blood pressure check-up in Room No. 7. Later, he personally accompanied the patient to Room No. 45 for an eye examination. The doctor diagnosed a corneal injury caused by the oil and recommended immediate surgery. Mr. Nandakumar then arranged an admission slip from Room No. 6 and helped Rangasamy get admitted to the eye treatment ward for surgical care.

Post-Intervention:

Rangasamy underwent treatment and remained in the hospital for four days. Following recovery, he was discharged and expressed heartfelt gratitude towards Mr. Nandakumar and the Help Centre team for their timely support and compassionate service.

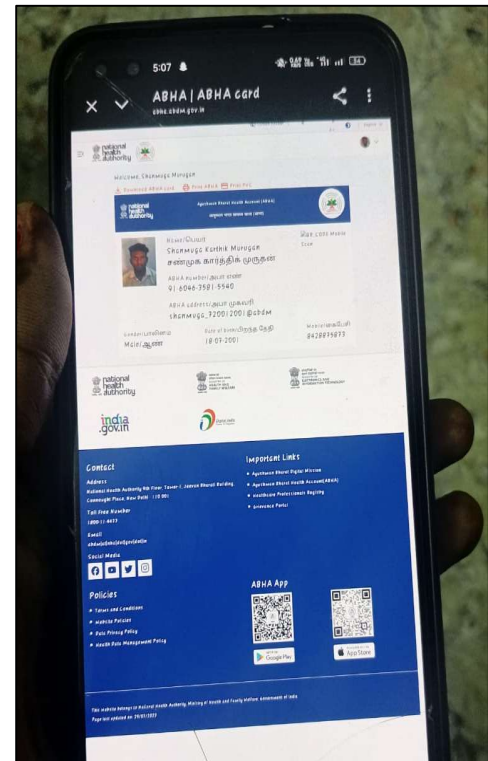

Project progress

We have been working diligently to instigate planned interventions focusing on high-degree participation from Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and the community. To achieve this, we've initiated entry-point programs such as free medical camps, skill training, and social security campaigns. These efforts have garnered remarkable rapport with women and the community, securing their cooperation and support for identifying SHGs and initiating planned interventions.

Building on this momentum, we've organized special meetings with eligible SHGs to orient them on the advantages of coordinated efforts and the need for a common platform. We've also illustrated the administrative structure, function, and Community Leaders' Network (CLN) formation processes, facilitating the recognition of capable SHG representatives from each CLN.

Furthermore, our team is committed to building capacities of existing and new SHG networks. We're working with 88 existing SHG networks to enhance their skills and support services for SHG women. Additionally, we're nurturing 61 new SHG networks to expand our reach and impact. Through vision-building exercises, leadership training, and grading exercises, we're empowering SHG women to achieve their personal visions and promoting collective action for community development.

A comprehensive training initiative was undertaken, empowering women through Financial Literacy, Digital Literacy, and Business Motivation programs. Financial Literacy training was imparted to 10,700 women, enhancing their knowledge on smart savings, wise lending, financial discipline, social security, and cashless transactions. Additionally, 6,655 women benefited from Digital Literacy training, gaining proficiency in smartphone usage, internet services, and various applications for communication, money transactions, and livelihood development. Furthermore, 7,651 women underwent Business Motivation training, acquiring essential skills and knowledge on entrepreneurship, priority matrix, enterprise formation, and marketing channels, enabling them to become self-reliant and contribute to their families' economic well-being.

A comprehensive awareness program on Government schemes was successfully conducted, reaching 3,580 women. The initiative utilized trained Knowledge Volunteers who effectively employed the peer education method to disseminate information. Following the awareness program, the team provided support to facilitate access to various State and Union Government schemes. This was achieved by leveraging the common platforms of Self-Help Groups (SHGs) and JLGs empowering women to benefit from these initiatives and improve their socio-economic well-being..
